A special thanks to Don Landels for putting everything together.


ETHANOL

Petition to the Canadian Federal Government to allow Ethanol Free Gasoline to be re-instated As you may already know the Federal government mandated that all grades of Gasoline sold in Canada be required to have an Ethanol blend by the end of 2023. No more Ethanol-Free Premium Gas. You know the detrimental effects of Ethanol on older carbureted engines, gasoline marine engines and other small gasoline engines. Over the past several days an approved petition through the House of Commons Web Site was built, asking that the Federal Government reverse this decision and make pure gas in higher octane grades once again available in Canada. This petition is supported by the NAACC who are also sending it out through their network. The petition is the work of Ian Smale, President & webmaster of the Vancouver Island Region WPC Club. - https://viwpc.chryslerclub.org Please consider supporting this petition - it only takes a couple of minutes to sign. It went live on Dec 19th, and will be closed on April 17th, 2024. Berwick staff did a fantastic job of setting up the tea, coffee and treats for the group which seemed to go well judging by the fact that the plates were all empty when we left.


Somewhere down the road the 109 will hold a small private car show for the residents of Berwick so we can show off our favorite rides and say thanks to everyone for their generosity.

Just so you know.

The BC Societies Act requires a few standards related to how a society handles it's revenew. The following list outlines the basics.

BC Societies EFV8 registered as a non-profit organization.

In B.C., not-for-profit / non-profit organizations are known as societies. Societies are independent, democratic organizations that are required to comply with the <u>Societies Act</u> and their own constitution and bylaws.

Societies do not earn any profits for its members. All money is donated to the organization's cause or goal. They may be eligible to:

- Register as a charitable organization: Canada Revenue Agency > Charities and giving
- Receive funding from community gaming grants or get a gambling event licence for fundraising
- Use money to support the organization's cause or goal, but they also use some money to pay for employee salaries and administrative need.

What every older Canadian should know about: Fraud and scams

Fraud is the number one crime against older Canadians. Though people of all ages can be victims of fraud, older people get targeted more than others. Some of the reasons are that they are often home during the day to answer the door or phone, they can be more trusting, and they may not have family or friends close by to ask for a second opinion.

People who commit fraud and scams are commonly called con artists. Con artists don't just target people who have a lot of money. A con artist may steal a small amount from many people. They use a variety of ways to reach people, including the Internet, phone calls and even door-to-door visits.

Victor's story:

Victor received a phone call telling him he had won a free trip. The caller started by congratulating Victor and telling him about the exciting details of the trip. Then the caller told Victor he needed to pay a small fee right away in order to claim his trip and asked Victor for his credit card number. Victor knew he had not entered a contest for a free trip and he also knew he should not give his credit card number over the phone to a stranger, especially one who called him. Victor hung up and called PhoneBusters to report a probable scam.

Common types of fraud and scams

Identity theft

Identity theft occurs when a con artist steals personal information from someone so they can pretend to be that person and then do things like apply for a credit card, take out a loan or mortgage, get a cell phone or withdraw bank funds. The con artist will try to get information such as a bank card number and personal identity number (PIN), credit card number, health card number, driver's license and Social Insurance Number (SIN). Sometimes they will steal or copy the documents; sometimes all they need is the information. If your wallet is lost or stolen, or mail you are expecting goes missing, you should report it right away to your bank or credit union.

Credit/debit card fraud

Credit card and debit card fraud occurs when a con artist uses your card, or a copy, to make purchases or withdraw money from your account. Keeping your card in sight, memorizing your PIN, and shielding your hand when you enter your PIN are ways you can reduce the risk of your credit card or debit card information being stolen and misused.

Online scams

There are many online scams and new ones appear all the time. Some appear to be asking for your help; some say there is a problem with your bank account or tax return. Scam e-mails are often easy to spot because of spelling and other mistakes, but some can look like they are coming from a person or organization you know. If you are not sure about an e-mail for example, if it asks you respond with personal or

financial information or to go to another Website and enter information there – call to check, and do not respond to the e-mail.

Phone and door-to-door scams

Phone and door-to-door scams are also very common. Someone will call or come to your door pretending to be a representative of a charity, an employee of a credit card company, or even a distant relative. You might be offered a free prize or trip. If you aren't completely sure who you are dealing with, do not give the person any money or information.

Sometimes people call or come to your door using high-pressure sales tactics to get you to buy something you don't want or need, or to talk you into getting work done on your house and then overcharging you or doing a bad job. While this is not always illegal, it is wrong and should be reported.

Tips and safeguards

- Keep all personal documents in a secure place. If you don't need them, do not carry your birth certificate, passport or SIN card.
- Never tell another person your PIN or account passwords and take care to cover your hand when entering your PIN at bank machines and when making store purchases.
- Safely dispose of old bills and statements-shredding is best.
- Do not click on pop-up windows or respond to e-mails, open attachments or go to Website links sent by people you do not know. Your bank or credit union will not send you anything by e-mail unless you ask them to.
- Never give out your credit card, bank account, or personal information to someone over the phone, at the door, or over the Internet unless you know the person or organization you are dealing with, or you made the contact.
- Do not sign an agreement or contract to buy anything without giving yourself time to think it over. If a salesperson insists that an "offer" is "time limited" and you must decide that moment, it is probably better not to buy.
- Be suspicious if someone you don't know asks you to send them money or a cheque, or to return money they "accidentally" sent you.
- Before hiring someone or agreeing to have work done on your home, ask for proof of identity and references and check them.

PerTronix Ignitor Install

This is an article about the tried and true <u>PerTronix Ignitor</u>, part number 447-1282. Are you uncomfortable doing things that you haven't done before? Are you the kind of person that doesn't feel really confident about doing something unless you have already done it? I sure am that way. I don't feel comfortable even giving advice or talking about a subject unless I have been there many many times and have a great understanding of how it works. I don't think anyone could blame you for being that way because not everyone just wants to dive in and fail. I have felt that way about timing and distributors pretty much my whole life.

If you feel that way, the PerTronix ignitor may change your mind. I sell a lot of these awesome little things, but was afraid to install one myself as I am a little bit ignition illiterate. So, I dug out an old flathead distributor that I wanted to restore and use on a project later. I first took off the cap and checked out the inside of this distributor. This distributor was kind of special to me because in the recent past I have purchased eleven or so flatheads in search of a good stock one. I didn't want a cam or anything on it to be built. I just wanted a good running stock one to put on a stand and start up every once in a while, and have a flathead on hand that ran.



This particular distributor came off of a running flathead that I purchased, then had the short block assembled by a friend. It is not special by any means, but I kept this distributor around to use it on something later. Once I had

the cap off the distributor I noticed that it was really dirty inside and I was going to have to clean it up and remove the old points. I started to undo the flat screws that came in the distributor. These screws seemed pretty used, but still got tight and didn't appear to have any stripped threads. I removed the old points as well as the wires for the points and the ground strap itself. I then noticed that the distributor had a grommet the wires went through and it seemed to be good and not dry rotted or cracked. The PerTronix ignitor does come with a new grommet, though, which is nice!



I have done some reading on points distributors and how they work as well as what the ignitor does to replace these points. In a points system the distributor rotates and the points open and close.

With the PerTronix, it has an ignitor module that reads off of a magnetic sleeve that rotates and comes in the kit. This is quite the upgrade for this old distributor and really wakes up the motor quite a bit. After cleaning the distributor, I was looking through my flathead pile of parts and I actually found a new rotor!

The installation of the ignitor and magnetic sleeve is pretty straight forward. The ignitor plate has three holes on one end. The middle hole will line up with the threaded hole for the condenser and the hole on the opposite side will line up with the point screw hole on the breaker plate. Don't forget to re-install ground wire to the breaker plate! I made a new ground wire with the supplied terminal connectors. You can run the wires through the hole in the distributor out and make sure they don't rub any moving parts. I also had to drill out the hole in the base of my distributor to run the wires out.



I installed the PerTronix ignitor in the distributor, put the new rotor on and installed the cap for now. I will put this in the next stock motor I buy and see if it won't fire up! If you are lucky enough to purchase a flathead or vehicle with a stock flathead that is already running, you can mark the orientation of the rotor and follow this install, add a coil and you should be able to start the motor right up with the ignition upgrade. If you have previously driven the car with stock points, then you will notice quite a difference in the performance of your flattie V8!



The parrot said, "Moses."


The burglar asked, "What kind of people would name their parrot, Moses?"
