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



This magnificent 54 is a classic example of a favorite ride that has been built with loads of patience and TLC. The Starliner is a ground up rebuild expertly rendered by Steve and his patient wife Kathleen, starting in 2020. Black acrylic lacquer paint is stunning.

1954 Studebaker Regal Starliner, engine numbers matching block 232 Studebaker overhead v/8, .030 over with 289 heads & 4bl intake & exhaust manifolds. AVS Eldelbrock 500 cfm carb stainless exhaust and mufflers, 12-volt conversion 3 speed overdrive standard trans with floor shift, 4.09 rear gear, factory power steering, exterior mods 1953 front bumper guards, 1953 free standing grille inserts, early 1953 hood and trunk tri-star emblems, 1956 Studebaker hawk dashboard. Every component has been replaced or rebuilt, all work done by the owner including body and paint. The paint is DuPont 99s diamond black acrylic lacquer, interior by Reg Young, all work performed in my home shop. The only time the Stude left the shop was for a wheel alignment, 2-year project. Chrome plating by electro shine.

BEST TRUCK





There is little wonder why you won't be able to find any photos or history for a 1936 Plymouth pick-up. That's because Plymouth never made a pickup in 1936.

This incredible build has a warm and wonderful story behind it that is a first for the Fords & Friends show. This special 36 started life as a 1932 Plymouth 4 dr sedan until it met the students at Mount Doug auto shop program and their instructor. At that point there was some cutting involved that included removing the back hall of the car. The cab was extended and then came the addition of a Ford pickup box. This would never be considered an easy thing to do. Today, with the TLC and expertise applied by Steve

Lamb the pickup now sports a 468 big block Chevy fully loaded with all kinds of goodies.



BEST FLATHEAD





This 33 Model 40 was built by the Rush Brothers (Bill & Dick) about 40 years ago for racing at Bonneville. The history is unique in many respects and includes a period of about 30 years where it sat idle in a field. Very sad state when repurchased by Rush Bros. in 2018.

The entire build is a story in itself with the flathead receiving all kinds of special treatment specifically designed for racing. A true "Hot Rod" is every sense of the word.

The flathead is 276 cu in Stroker with a girdled 4" Merc crank. Ross pistons are 60 over, scat rods and an Isky 400 cam. Top side is Offenhauser heads with dual Holly 94 carbs and adjustable lifters.

Today this special rod is in the creative hands of Dave Hargraves receiving lots of attention to make it even more perfect. It is predictable that this 33 coupe is one of those very special rides that will be a favorite ride throughout eternity.

We thank Dave for attending FNF 23 and offer our most sincere congratulations on such a terrific build. Keep your eyes open for this one to flash up in Esquimalt!







January 12, 1904 – Ford sets new land speed record

Before Henry Ford ever started the car company that would bear his name, he collaborated with a bicycle racer named Tom Cooper to build two racing cars in 1902. The vehicles were relatively interchangeable, both featuring a 1156 cu.in. (18.9 L) inline-4 engine that produced between 70 and 100 hp. Two weeks before their first scheduled race, the cars would not start. Fearing another failure and on the brink of <u>losing his second car company</u>, Ford sold his stake in them for \$800 to Cooper and pioneering auto racer Barney Oldfield. However, being the marketing man he was, Ford retained rights to any publicity and promotions surrounding the vehicles.





Painted red and yellow and named 999 and Arrow, respectively, the bare bones cars would prove ferocious on the track. Oldfield won the first race he ever entered driving the 999, a five mile race called the Manufacturer's Challenge Cup. Henry's obsession with speed seemed like it may pay off, but it soon became deadly.

The car dubbed Arrow also had a successful career, until driver Frank Day crashed the car in September 1903, killing himself in the process. Following the wreck, Henry Ford bought the vehicle back hoping to capitalize on its existing publicity. He and his mechanics repaired it and dubbed it the new 999, as the original red car had been retired from the race track. Then on this day in automotive history in 1904, Henry took the 999 to New Baltimore, Michigan and drove the vehicle himself with mechanic Ed Huff at the throttle. The pair set a new automobile land speed record of 91.37 mph (140.05 km/h) on the ice over Lake St. Clair. At this point, the Ford Motor Company had yet to have its first

birthday, but this success attracted new investors. Ford's achievements behind the wheel may be all but forgotten, but they helped him build a global car company.
