Thank you to all 109 club members who attended and brought along friends and family. So glad you continue to support 109 club activities.





SPARKS TO NUTS - RALF ST. CLAIR

Taper Caper

I am really excited to announce that this is the last time (for a while) I'll be writing about wheels. But there is one more topic we need to talk about. And that's hubs. Not the most thrilling topic, you'd think. But when it comes to old Fords like Phyllis the '42...

When you take off one of Phyllis' wheels (sounds vaguely rude, somehow) you find a brake drum with five studs coming out of it for the wheel nuts. In the middle is a very large nut held in place by a cotter pin. The hub is completely sealed, so as mentioned in previous episodes it's not possible to check shoe condition, or even brake adjustment, visually at all. If you think there's something amiss in the hubs you have to pull them off. This is a bit annoying, because there are many things it would be really useful to be able to check without taking it all apart, such as drum run out (circularity) and shoe clearance. Anyway, there you are.

The cotter pin comes out first. It's clear that Henry Ford owned a cotter pin factory as they are all over these cars. Then you need to remove the big nut. This is meant to be torqued to 200 ft/lbs. That's a lot of torque (and very little action). I think of it as three labradors at the end of a ruler or one labrador at the end of a metre stick (one argument for metric—it saves you a fortune in labradors). In any case, 200 ft/lbs is a LOT of torque. Out comes the breaker bar, with a bit of luck (and some sweat) the nut comes off and you move onto the next challenge.

The reason for all the torque is that the axle has a taper on the end and the wheel needs to be held onto this taper. I won't comment on the wisdom of using a taper fit for rotational force (okay, I will. The entire weight of this 3200lb car is trying to break the taper interference whenever the car speeds up or slows down. When you brake all the braking forces run through the taper. This is a huge amount of weight and force twisting the wheels backwards and forwards.

It's actually sort of mind-boggling.) However, do not despair! Ford engineers provide a handy dandy locating key to prevent the wheels coming off (literally). When you actually hold it in your hand the key seems like a very small piece of metal doing a lot of work.

Because it's a taper fit, you need a puller to get the hub off. So of course Ford designed it so that a generic Canadian Tire Pulls-All[™] would work. Obviously, this is a joke. You need a specific puller that costs over \$100 and comes from the States (see the photo). It's designed not to damage anything. Pulling the hub off is still pretty nerve-wracking. It takes a lot of pulling. Generally, as I'm sure many of us know, pullers really just provide a bit of a tug in the right direction and sharp taps with a hammer do the work of loosening the joint. In this case, though, the puller is wound up really tightly. The metal bar, which is high tensile steel about ½ inch thick, visibly bends from the force. Meanwhile you tap the drum from as far away as you can get while trying not to think about how quickly it's going to let go and propel itself through the garage wall, the compost heap, and next door's Tesla.

At least you usually do. This was the case the second time I removed the hubs. The first time I simply removed the cotter pins and undid the big nuts easily by hand. Somebody (looking at you, previous owner) had missed the first "20" of the torque setting and gone straight to the final "0." I'm being absolutely accurate here. Since I owned Phyllis this is the one thing that came closest to killing me. Turns out the locating keys do actually work after all.

Inside the hub is a ton of nasty brake dust (do not inhale) and all the brake parts. Once the hubs are off it's really easy to work on the brakes because everything is right there in front of you. In my case, I replaced a few parts, made sure the handbrake cable was attached to something, and put it all back together. Oh, and spent quite a few dollars on a torque wrench able to handle a couple of labradors.

If there is a morale to this story, and in fact all the brake stories, it is that when you buy an old car you can never assume the previous owner has done everything the way it needs to be done. My big lesson (one that I'm still learning) is that unless you buy Jim's Mercury you are going to be spending a lot of time and money just making sure the car is safe and sound. It's worth it, and it's fun to do, but I'll never believe "Needs nothing, ready to drive" again!

I sent Robert 7 questions to answer. With the help of his daughter, our Club President Heidi Bada here are Robert's responses. Enjoy!



What was the first car that truly captured your heart and what's the story behind how you acquired it?

It was a 1950 Meteor convertible. Paid \$495 in 1958. We had it for 10 years. Donna was my girlfriend at that time, and we went all over the place in that car. Even to the Yukon in 1961. I was on vacation. Donna, her dad, and I went to the Yukon where I had a job and they stayed for three months. They flew home to Victoria, and I stayed on with my job almost another year.

What's the most memorable road trip or event you've attended with your classic car and what made it so special?

Driving to the Yukon (Victoria to Elsa, Yukon) in the 1950 Meteor convertible was memorable. We broke down at Carmacks, Yukon and slept in the car overnight. We got rescued the next morning. They towed us to Carmacks then off we went on our way to Elsa. On my way back next spring, that car hit a moose, and I had to get it fixed again and I was able to drive it back to Victoria. What else... [we] painted the car purple. **2**

On another occasion, we ran out of gas on our wedding night. After the reception, and heading to our Sooke home, and at Doodney Flats, the car ran out of gas. It was October 4, 1963. We weren't rescued until the night shift of Sooke Sawmill was driving by.

Has your interest changed over the years, and do you have any advice for new collectors?


The sooner you start having a classic car, the longer you'll have to enjoy it.

Club member Norrie Spencer's grandson Colin Menzies shared some photos of Barred Owls that have been roosting in the owls house made by Norrie.






